**APPROVAL OF MARCH 27, 2014 MEETING MINUTES**

**MOTION:** Mr. Powell moved to approve the minutes as written.

**SECOND:** Mr. Kissinger seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

**DISCUSSION**

**Rule 61G10-11.010, FAC, Seals**

Ms. Chastain presented the rule based on a request from Mr. Kroll to address the use of a rubber stamp seal. Current rule language utilized by the Board of Architecture and Interior Design was reviewed.

After discussion the following motion was made:

**MOTION:** Mr. Kroll moved to approve the modification to the rule to allow a rubber stamp seal.

**SECOND:** Mr. Kissinger seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Ms. Clark asked if the proposed rule would have an adverse impact on small businesses or be likely to directly or indirectly increase regulatory costs to any entity in excess of \$200,000 in the aggregate in Florida within one year after the implementation of the rule.

**MOTION:** Mr. Conant moved that the proposed rule would not have an adverse impact on small businesses or be likely to directly or indirectly increase regulatory costs to any entity in excess of \$200,000 in the aggregate in Florida within one year after the implementation of the rule.

### **Rule 61G10-12.002, FAC, Fees**

Ms. Chastain provided the board with projections through June 30, 2018 and based on the projections the department was recommending the board amend the rule to reduce fees by 25 percent.

**MOTION:** Mr. Powell moved to reduce the fees by 25 percent for individual and business renewals.

**SECOND:** Mr. Conant seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

**MOTION:** Mr. Kroll moved that the proposed rule would not have an adverse impact on small businesses or be likely to directly or indirectly increase regulatory costs to any entity in excess of \$200,000 in the aggregate in Florida within one year after the implementation of the rule.

**SECOND:** Mr. Smith seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

## **Rule 61G10-18.002, FAC, Board Approval of Continuing Education Providers**

Ms. Chastain presented the rule and suggested the rule be amended to update the application form number and effective date and update the rule to provide for the changes based on the implementation of Rule 61G10-18.002(4), FAC.

Mr. Kissinger inquired about waiving the provider fee for the automatic approved providers. **Ms. Clark informed the board they did not have statutory authority to** waive the fee for one entity and not all.

**SECOND:** Mr. Kroll seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.
